REPORTS ON OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Birthing Kits – District 23 Project

Led by Sandy Nicholson and Robyn Evans



The Club assembled 400 birthing kits for the Birthing Kit Foundation Australia (BKFA) in late June 2019. Our club budget of \$1200 for 400 kits was used in conjunction with Trinity College to hold an assembly day with Year 11 students during their community involvement day on 26 Jun 2019. Year 11 Child Studies teacher, Lauren Jones was the coordinator for the day.

Breast Care cushions – District 23 Project

Led by Robyn Ruchel

This D23 service project is strongly supported by Club members. Cushions provide comfort to women (and men) in the post-operative phase of breast surgery. We also supply drainage bags for patients as they recuperate at home.

The last 12 months we have supplied to Calvary and Broken Hill hospitals as well as a Gawler local, with Alice Springs and Darwin hospitals finding a lost stash supplying their needs at present. As we have had a large donation of cushions from quilters, Chris Frick was able to take 20 unstuffed cushions to the presidents meeting and we have also posted 20 unstuffed cushions to Zonta Club Noarlunga Southern Vales, with them reimbursing the cost of postage. They also appreciated ones that were made from fabric that suit men as there has been a need.

We are still fortunate to be receiving support from Gawler Quilt Circle and SA Quilters guild and their member clubs, the last batch of cushions coming from Tea Tree Gully club. Our supporters supply cushions rather than drainage bags as the material outlay is almost a quarter less. I am currently making sufficient drainage bags to cover requests.

Boxes of Love

This project is self funded through donations. Karen collects the various toiletries from NDVS and packages the items into usable packs. This process provides Workers with a quick and simple way of distributing pack of toiletries for women in need. Karen works with the NDVS staff to ensure a suitable supply of kits is available at all times.

Elimination of Violence Against Women in the Gawler Area

Zonta Club of Gawler was instrumental in leading the establishment of a domestic violence network in 2016 whose role is to raise awareness of domestic and family violence and the impact it has on the Gawler community. The Network also advocates to all levels of government on issues such as the lack of appropriate and affordable housing, economic insecurity and service support.

During 2019-20 the Network continued to be chaired by the Zonta Club of Gawler which enables the Club to connect with the community with a powerful visual focus to raise awareness that maximizes Zonta International's program of eliminating violence against women. Members Pru Blackwell, Kim Wright, Pam Young, Chris Frick, Denise Scappaticci, Naomi Reschke, Val Mew, Beppy Golan and Sandra Sullivan are the Club's predominant contributors to the Network.

Most significantly this year, the Network's profile was increased through the local Gawler newspaper "The Bunyip".

This prompted the Network to commend the Editor. The following extract from correspondence to the Editor highlighted the exceptional level of support.

*"Thank you so much to you and your staff for your strong and thought provoking coverage supporting the Gawler Domestic Violence Network's 2019 "**Gawler Says NO to Family Violence**" banner project. Gawler Council, businesses and schools proudly displayed 26 banners and 50 posters this year along with several electronic versions. Combined with our Vigil, the Zonta coffee morning at Cibos, our shopping centre handouts and your wide media coverage, we achieved our aim of getting the community of Gawler again talking about Domestic Abuse. We can only hope our community members will more readily recognise Domestic Abuse for what it is, and stand up and speak out when they see it."*


The level of journalism ranging from front page pictures and articles through to sensitive reporting on DV victims' stories, raised awareness throughout the town which complemented the visible presence of the Network's activities.

Zonta Clubs of District 23 participated at the combined Australian and New Zealand District's conference in September 2019 in Brisbane at which a presentation was delivered on the Gawler DV Network, its role and functions and program scope. It was delivered as an example of a community development approach to prevention programs. Several interstate Clubs continue to communicate with Gawler to share learnings and achievements.

The Network also participated in Gawler's Reconciliation Day – May 29th 2019- which was held indoors at the Gawler Recreation centre due to inclement weather. Organisers still managed to attract many community group activities and displays which enabled the Network's material to be widely circulated which included the "I Expect Respect" stickers, domestic violence fact sheets and photo opportunities with a photo board prepared by Lou and Chris Frick which was covered with sayings reflecting the Network's mission.

The Network has solidly established electronic data sourcing information from Australia's National Research Organisation for Women's Safety (ANROWS), Our Watch and Women's Safety Service SA (WSSSA) data. This has been used in fact sheets for distribution as

required in hard copy. A power point presentation was provided to the Gawler Civic Centre for ongoing use in its café space.



Similarly the Network's Facebook site is regularly posted with information and linkages for peak agencies and support phone numbers. The Network's Facebook page also highlights new and emerging government strategies and programs. Kim Wright has been the author of the fact sheets and for maintaining Facebook postings.

Members of the Network lodged an application to the Australian Government's Community Grants Hub for Community – led Projects to Prevent Violence against Women and Children. The application was designed to seek funds for a project worker who would develop a community education and awareness raising strategy accompanied with PR tools. It was premised on a three year program with a strong focus on a sustainable outcome for the Network. Despite the application being unsuccessful it provided members with a guiding document which could underpin future proofing options for the Network.

Gawler DV Network's program includes a number of events during the global 16 days of activism campaign.

The **16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence** is an annual international campaign that kicks off on 25 November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and runs until 10 December, Human Rights Day. It was started by activists at the inaugural Women's Global Leadership Institute in 1991 and continues to be coordinated each year by the Centre for Women's Global Leadership.

During this period and utilising their orange colour theme , members decorated Gawler's main street and Tony Piccolo's (Light Electorate MP) office main street window. Front line staff at his office, the Town of Gawler and Cibo's café all wore Zonta Says NO to Violence against women T shirts.

On Saturday November 23rd 2019 Zonta facilitated a morning tea at Cibo's. This was well supported by Zonta invitees and their family and friends. However numbers were slightly down on last year's event. Mayor Redman spoke passionately to the group about the power of prevention programs such as the approach in Gawler and also called on the involvement of "good men" as a powerful message and sign to highlight alternative behaviours. Pleasin' Choir provided a rousing number of feminist based songs ,whilst encouraging everyone present to sing along as well. Pam Young co-ordinates this event and is grateful to Cibo's management, Joe and all his willing staff.

The morning tea is set against the back drop of Zonta Says No to Family Violence banners which are suspended across the main street, on the hotels in the main street and at the town’s three major entry points , Gawler Health Service and a mixture of primary and secondary schools. This project has increased in number this year to 26 banner sites and distribution of posters to 50 main street shop windows. Martin Kennedy (White Ribbon Ambassador) co-ordinates this project and is building an evaluation profile of the project all of which has been favourable.

In conjunction with Womens’ Safety Service,(WSS), the Network held two shopping centre stalls – Coles Green and Coles Central on November 22nd and 23rd 2019 - from which information was provided to passers by. Distribution included domestic violence fact sheets, White Ribbon merchandise and Zonta and WSS brochures.



On November 28th 2019 the Network held its first twilight Vigil and Remembrance service which was conducted to highlight the women who have died / been murdered by current or former partners. The vigil service was written by Sandra Sullivan and was attended by some 36 people from agencies and individuals. The vigil was held at 530pm on the recreation space on the corner of Adelaide Road and Fifth Streets. The Network was very grateful to the Town of Gawler for granting the Vigil planners permission to use the site and to suspend Gawler Says No to Family Violence banners on all sides of the fencing.

Similarly helpful were Taylor and Forgie for advice on the service structure and the Gawler Anglican Parish for providing a bell ringer at the end of the service. The support of SAPOL being present assisted some attendee enquiries and the role played by the Bunyip at the event were significant outcomes.

Members of the Network have been briefing the Mayor and staff at two face to face meetings to update her on our proposed activities and particularly to develop a conversation on social housing. It has been tentatively agreed that a housing forum will be held at a later date where housing “experts” can discuss the needs of the Gawler population in terms of short and long term affordable housing.

In October 2019 the Network, through the ZC of Gawler was runner up for the Service Clubs Association of SA Premier’s Award for Community Education for the Gawler Banner Project, receiving \$400.00 in prize money.

The Network was particularly proud to have been selected as a joint winner of the Town of Gawler Australia Day Awards in the Community Group of the Year category. It was accepted by members at the Australia Day Breakfast on Monday January 26th 2020 at Gawler’s Apex Park.

Family Care Kits

Family Care Kits developed from the Emergency Care Kits that were created to provide sanitary items for girls in need. In 2019/20 the move was made to Family Care Kits due to the increased need for families in general. The kits were distributed to Gawler and District College, however the kits have not been utilised. It is recommended that the club reconsider this project.

Scholarships

The club provides three general scholarships, one to each local secondary school and one dedicated to a female STEM student at Gawler and District College.

The general scholarships are provided to a female student nominated by each school who is in danger of not completing Year 12 due to hardship.

2019 Scholarships were awarded to Bianca Schomburgk, Xavier College, Shyla Nilsson, Trinity College and Jamie Stansborough, Gawler & District College.

STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics)

Led by Naomi Reschke

The Zonta Club of Gawler has provided a scholarship of \$500 per annum to a female student at Gawler and District College to increase the opportunity for girls to engage in STEM subjects. The scholarship is in line with that of Zonta International which has awarded six scholarships from six countries for young women including computer science, informatics, educational data mining, and learning, design and technology.

The Zonta Club of Gawler awarded the STEM scholarship to Tianna Ranford an outstanding student at Gawler and District College. Tianna will access her scholarship

funds to purchase resources for her work towards a medical degree. As Tianna says “*thank you for supporting my dreams*”

Spreading the Reading Bug

Spreading the Reading Bug Project is an early literacy project which commenced in 2017. The main collection points for pre-loved books continue to be The Gawler Community House; the local member, Tony Picollo’s office and Gawler Drake supermarket. The second half of 2019 year saw the Gawler community generously donating hundreds of pre loved and new books to the project.

The year 2020 started with an excellent book stock; both the amount and the quality continues to be high. Fortunately, at the start of 2020 a working bee was held to sort a large part of the book stock.

In early March, Zonta was invited to participate in a Gawler Fringe event held at Gawler West. A broadly successful event, the day was well patronised by families, and children enthusiastically selected their books from the supply displayed by Zonta club members. Our Reading Bug mascot (aka Pam Young) attended to engage with families and particularly, small humans attending the in the Gawler event. Some families got into the spirit of the occasion and came along with books to donate to be passed on at future events.

Just days after the Fringe event it became clear that the planned 2020 events for distributing to small humans living in the region had to be cancelled because of the Covid 19 pandemic restrictions.

Negotiations then took place with Gawler Council through their ‘Community Connect’ initiative. As an outcome of these negotiations Zonta Club of Gawler is still able to continue with the project through the Covid 19 pandemic. In partnership with the council, collected pre-loved books are distributed to identified families.

All Reading Bug Project members work hard through the year to keep our book stocks high and keep the books moving back into the community. Also we would like to again thank Patricia for her ongoing support of the project by providing suitable storage in her shed. Finally, many thanks must go to our friends of Zonta who help when needed, which is often.

Supporting women in the community through art

Led by Sandra Sullivan and Naomi Reschke

Zonta Club member, Sandra Sullivan initiated a project to link with senior and isolated women in the broader community to provide an opportunity to experience art through active participation in workshops. In partnership with the Gawler Community Centre a “Colouring Conversations” group was established which invited participants to engage in art activities which supported their wellbeing and mental health. The members of the group met on a number of occasions prior to the Covid – 19 isolation process. The workshop catered for up to ten participants and numbers were retained each week. The project will be followed up at the appropriate time. The Gawler Community Centre has been extremely supportive and encouraging throughout the process. An expansion of the project may be negotiated if the required space is available at the centre.



A second stream under consideration for this project is to link with women in aged care to discuss works of art and provide an opportunity to engage with conversation, explore ideas, and stimulate interaction for the support of wellbeing and care of senior women. (Women In Aged Care) This will be developed after the Covid 19 isolation.

DISTRICT AND AREA ACTIVITIES

The year provided members with many opportunities to participate in Area 2 and District 23 events.

- A reception celebrating Zonta’s Centennial at Government House at the invitation of Governor Hieu Van Le attended by many club members

Planning

Webpage

Fundraising

Over the past 12 months from 2019/20 we saw changes with our fundraising. We held a moving evening (feature film POMS) and had a successful raffle later in the year. Our annual quiz night was postponed due to the number of competing fundraising events occurring in Gawler during that month.

Normally our major raffle is launched at the Quiz Night, however we still launched the raffle in October. As usual we sold tickets during the Rotary Village Fair and members also sold tickets privately. Even without the Quiz Night sales we raised approximately \$1,800.

Our fundraising is the foundation of our projects and looking forward we will need to have a few major events to raise much needed funds.

Zonta International Foundation

One third of our fundraising supports Zonta International Foundation Projects. These projects are determined at the Biennial Convention. The projects over the 2018 – 2020 Biennial international projects are in partnership with the United Nations Women, UNFPA and UNICEF

During the 2018-2020 Biennium, three projects are being supported by the International Service Fund:

- Let Us Learn Madagascar: An Integrated Program for Adolescent Girls.
- Eid Bi Eid (Hand in Hand): A program to improve the resilience and empowerment of Syrian refugee and vulnerable Jordanian women.
- Ending Child Marriage: A program to accelerate global action.

The Zonta Club of Gawler will donate \$989 this year to the Zonta International Foundation in support of these projects. This is less than previous years, reflecting the reduction of fundraising in part due to Covid 19.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The Zonta Club of Gawler is also involved in local events where we work closely with other service clubs for the benefit of the community. Some of these events also give us an opportunity to be involved in ways that are not the usual Zonta business yet allow us to honour the commitment that other volunteer groups make to the community.

Gawler Community Services Forum

The forum is an information network of community groups and agencies that meet monthly to share information, discuss issues and develop partnerships and collaborate to improve services for Gawler residents. The club is a financial member of the forum.

Gawler Australia Day Breakfast

Led by the Gawler Apex Club, local service clubs combine on Australia Day to get up bright and early to serve breakfast to the community. Cooking and serving of pancakes, jam and cream has been our role for several years. This event is a favourite with club members.

Gawler International Women's Day Breakfast

Zonta once again partnered with the Gawler Girl Guides, View Club and CWA Bottle Brush Ladies to organise the successful annual International Women's Day breakfast on March 6 2020. The event held at Nixon's Function Centre and generously supported by Shawn Noack and his staff, attracted over 120 patrons.

Following a flag ceremony by the Girl Guides, scholarships were awarded to 3 young women from our secondary schools to assist with their education expenses. Our guest speaker this year was a local young woman, Pamela Wittman, a health worker in the Airforce who shared her vast experience with emergency situations both locally and internationally. Her story thus far is an inspiration.

The community, businesses and committee members provided items for a successful raffle organised by the Girl Guides which will assist in funding further scholarships.

The Bunyip provided valuable coverage of the event.

Service Clubs of Light Forum

This Forum is run by Member of Light, Tony Piccolo. Representatives of service clubs meet on an ad hoc basis to explore ways to increase membership and connect with younger members of the community. Chris Frick, as President, attends these meetings.

Community Connect

This initiative was implemented by the Town of Gawler during the Covid19 crisis. The intention is to ensure all members of our community are supported during social isolation.
